Thoughts and Observations My First Experiences in Radio Communications

Prior to getting my HAM license in 2012, I previously had acquired no experience what so ever with radio communications, beyond listening to radio adventure, mystery, comedy, and popular hit songs/tunes. I had done, perhaps, a lot of receiving, but absolutely no transmitting.

The only exception I can find is my time serving as a U.S. Army rifle platoon leader back in the 1960's. I controlled and directed a so-called rifle platoon composed of three rifle squads and one weapons squad. Each rifle squad was composed of about 10 men, eight of which bore a standard single-shot or semi-automatic rifle, plus tow men bearing a fully-automatic firing rifle. The weapons squad consisted of a similar number of men who, between them, operated two fully automatic machine guns, plus two LAWS (light anti-tank weapons), some times called "bazookas". The weapons squad was there to help the platoon subdue/overcome an enemy giving us particularly still or determined resistance.

As platoon leader, I controlled and directed my four squad leaders by means of a portable radio slung over my neck and one shoulder, each squad leader had one also. These radios were commonly refeffed to as "walkie-talkies", but were simply small radios by means of which I controlled my squad leaders, both in training maneuvers and actual field operations. When talking with them or giving them directions by radio, they sometimes were within visual contact and sometimes not.

So much for those below me in the chain of command. To communicate with my superior at company level, I had with me at all times a so-called RTO (radio-telephone operator) who carried a radio on his back called a PRC10 (later a PRC25). When ever I needed to confer with my superior (usually a captain; I was a lieutenant), my RTO would hand me a microphone, and I would proceed to make my transmission. Bat at company headquarters, wherever that might be situated, my company commander had, just as I did, a RTO with either another PRC10 or PRC25 mounted on his back, through which he controlled me and all other company platoon leaders. In addition, the



company commander had also to maintain contact with the battalion level of command, and for this he usually hand a much heavier, more-powerful jeep-mounted radio, as the distances involved at this command level could be and frequently were substantial.

As a battalion-level staff officer, which I also was for a time, I also had a jeep-mounted radio with much I communicated with the battalion commander and/or the battalion S-4 (logistics chief).

Thoughts & Observations Participation in Public Events

Since receiving my ham license in early 2012, I have been a participant in ten such events, to be specific; 6 Lilac Day Parades, 3 Bloomsdays, and one, let's see, I believe it was back in 2015, a sort of mini-Bloomsday held over on north Market Street. I was one of a ham radio team very hurriedly assembled and dispatch to the site one Saturday morning. Anyway, it all adds up to a total of ten.

Just what advantage/reward awaits someone by participation in these events, or, putting it another way, just what's in it for you? Put very simply, it just looks good on your ham resume, in either written or spoken form. When you can say or write to someone "I was on the ham radio team at the Bloomsday race in 2016." It is a credential-enhancing factor right in the same league with being a net controller. It is always, repeat always, impressive.

In my first year, I participated in very little, nothing really. I had just gotten my license, nobody knew where or who I was, and I was just as ignorant myself of just what ham activities were going on. My first "public event" participation was at the Lilac Day Parade of 2013. By this time I had been making radio contacts, other hams were getting to know me, and managed to recruit me for the first time in 2013. Something I noticed right off on these public events, ham radio volunteer recruiting proceeds, almost desperately sometimes, right up until the very day of the event. It is a real task getting enough volunteers to make up an adequate team for the event, always is.

Well, whatever, I was recruited for the 2013 Lilac Day event, proceeded to the assembly point, and was assigned a post or station on the parade route with absolutely not a shred of training, instruction, or preparation of any sort. I wasn't of much use at that one, spent most of the whole 3-4 hours just standing at my station looking around, making mental notes on a lot of things, and listening to my radio.

A primary concern, (judging from the traffic on my radio), seemed to be in the spacing between parade elements. If the space/internal between two parades elements became too long or too short, there would be a flurry of radio traffic to correct situation, i.e., either slow one elements down to let the other catch up, or speed one up to catch up with the other, or whatever. Once correction at one place in the parade had been made, it would invariably have ramifications on element intervals elsewhere, so more frenzied chatter would follow almost immediately. Finally, a temporary state of equilibrium for the whole parade would be achieved, to last heaven only knows how long. Mind you, I am not trying to present this all as monotonous, boring or uninteresting. On the contrary, one of those interval adjustments I listened to was one of the most thrilling radio adventures I'd ever listened to.

Equipment: If I've managed to stir your interest in public events a bit, remember that equipment requirements are simple and basic. All you need is a 2-meter handheld with nothing more than a rubber-ducky antenna. Nearly all public events are done on the 2-meter band frequencies. Occasionally, another frequency band may be used, but only temporarily, and for only one particular sector post/station of the parade. It never replaces the basic 2-meter frequency. However, if this

bothers you, then get yourself a dual band handheld, maybe even a multiband one. But a 2-meter is really all you will need. Others are available.

Now, one more thing you will need, well, two actually, what is called an "earpiece" microphone and a radio belt clip. Sometimes both of these come with the radio when you purchase it. Or they may be accessory items which you have to select and purchase separately. If you lack either or both, get in touch with your dealer and order ones for your particular model/make of radio. Once earpiece microphone is connected to your radio, and the radio hangs on your belt, you will find yourself able with ease to devote full attention to radio traffic and at the same time have both hands and arms free to wave, gesture, signal, things you may have to do not infrequently before all is over. No noise whatever emanates from your radio, all is channeled directly to your ear via the microphone cord. You transmit with a mini push-to-talk switch positioned on the microphone cord anywhere you like and can be manipulated with nothing more than the thumb and forefinger of one hand. Believe me, though, you will do a lot more listening than transmitting, I did kid you not.

And don't forget an emergency bag slung over your arm and/or shoulder, extra antenna(s), extra batteries, extra microphone(s), and yes, a full and complete extra radio, just in case.

There will be other things to cope with than interval and adjustments, spectators passing out on the sidewalk, injuries, accidents, lost children, petty crime (sometimes), ambulance and police cars must be summoned regularly and I promise you will get into some of this stuff, too. Stand tall and be alert, never complain, do your best at whatever falls into your hands to do.




