


### Fox-1A Launch Date now September

According to the Vandenberg AFB Launch Schedule on the Space Archive web site, updated on June 28th, the launch of Fox -1A has been pushed back to September 25th. Original launch date for what will be our newest FM satellite was August 27. This mission is NROL-55, National Reconnaissance Office Launch #55. Fox-1A is a replacement for AO-51 that gave the amateur satellite community great service for almost 8 years. Fox-1A has a U/v FM transponder on board.

Uplink: 435.180 MHz FM - 67.0 hz tone

Downlink: 145.980 MHz FM



### EO-79 & EO-80 (QB50p2) Transponders

EO-79 and 80 that have been in orbit for just over a year may have their transponders activated for general use in the near future. This information according to the ARRL Letter dated June 25th. EO-79 carries a linear SSB transponder that was successfully tested in April.

FUNcube inverting 400 mW SSB/CW transponder

Uplink: 435.035-435.065 MHz LSB Downlink: 45.935-145.965 MHz USB.



EO-80 carries a FM transponder that was successfully testing in June at the 1.5 watt power level. According to the letter it could be activated at the .5 or 1 watt power level. Even at .5 watts it will be twice as strong as our only current FM satellite SO-50. EO-80 has a U/v transponder like Fox-1A.

Uplink: 435.080 MHz FM - 210.7 hz tone

Downlink: 145.840 MHz FM
